

JOSEPH HEINRICH, WOODVALE AVENUE, ANSWERS SUMMONS

Native of Austria Came
Here With Parents at
Age of 17

STEEL PENSIONER

Lost Right Leg in Acci-
dent in Mills Here 22
Years Ago

Joseph Aloysius Heinrich, 71, of 125 Woodvale Avenue, a resident of the Woodvale section for 54 years, died at Mercy Hospital at 2:45 o'clock this morning. He had been ill for the past month and was admitted to the hospital as a medical patient on April 23.

Born in Austria, August 24, 1866, Mr. Heinrich was a son of Karl and Antonio Heinrich, who came to this country when Joseph Heinrich was 17 years old and located in Woodvale. Shortly after his arrival here, Joseph Heinrich entered the employ of the old Cambria Iron Company and after a long period of service there resigned to become a chef at the Merchants Hotel, Main Street. A few years later he returned to the mills and upon his retirement some six years ago had a total service in the local plant of 48 years. He was a shearman in the Gaultier department for many years. Twenty-two years ago Mr. Heinrich met with an accident at work, necessitating amputation of his right leg. On recovery he returned to his old position.

Mr. Heinrich and Anna Partson of this city were united in marriage at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Railroad Street, on October 2, 1900, by Rev. Father Theobald, O. S. B. Mrs. Heinrich survives, with these children: Anna, wife of Clarence O'Shea, rear 125 Woodvale Avenue, and Joseph Heinrich, Jr., intermarried with Lena Fudleiner, 126 Maple Avenue.

Joseph A. Heinrich was a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church from the time he came to Johnstown and was affiliated with St. Joseph's Society and the German-Austrian Musical & Beneficial Society. He was a brother of Louis Heinrich and Charles Heinrich, both of Woodvale Avenue, and Ernest Heinrich of Getatown. OPERATOR SOUGHT

World War Veteran Hit
Along Road; Driver
Makes Escape

Two men met their deaths as a result of highway accidents in a four-county area over the week-end, and five persons were injured.

H. J. Stroster, 38, of 100 Washington Street, Vandergrift, was killed instantly at 3:30 o'clock this morning when he is believed to have fallen asleep at the wheel of his car, which left Route 126 near the Bedford-Fulton County line and overturned. Stroster was thrown from the wreckage, his head striking a rock. The car also overturned on Stroster and he was pinned under the wreckage for more than a half hour. He was dead when extricated. A physician said the man probably had been killed instantly, as his skull was crushed when his head struck the rock.

Michael Shandosky of 1327 1/2 Sixteenth Street, Altoona, was injured in the accident in which Stroster was killed.

Shandosky suffered lacerations above the left eye and body bruises and was treated at the Everett Hospital dispensary.

Stroster and Shandosky had been in Washington, D. C., over the week-end, and were returning to Altoona, where both are employed. The Stroster car left the highway, went down over a small embankment and overturned twice. Pvt. C. S. Renz, of the Bedford detail of the State Motor Police, conducted the investigation. Stroster is survived by his widow and four children. The body has been prepared for burial at the D. S. Gump Funeral Home in Bedford.
